He Kōrero Whakamutunga

Mai i te tīmatatanga o te tau e whakapoukaha ana mātou kia noho mauri tau ai ngā kōhine i roto i te kura poari araa i te hostel.

E te whānau no mai ra ano te kaupapa o Hāto Hohepa.

We were established by the Sisters of Our Lady of the Missions to provide education for needy young Māori girls.

Ae ra, he kotiro haututū a mātou ā tātou katoa, ENGARI TUA ATU O ENEI, ko ngā mokopuna e waha taumahatanga i runga i o rātou pokohiwi rangatahi, waiho, ma te whānau o te hau kāinga e tauawhi. Kei o rātou ake whānau ngā rongoa mo rātou. Kare kei Hato Hohepa.

Aroha mai ra e te whānau, we are not a baby-sitting facility or a reform school, a drop-in centre, or a hotel. We do not have the ability to provide specialist pastoral care services. We are not a school for the elite or the indulged.

We are a Decile 2 Integrated Tikanga Māori, Tikanga Hāhi school to which is attached a hostel. St Joseph's has a holistic approach to Maturanga, an approach that is underpinned by our values of Manaakitanga and Whanaungatanga. We have Rules that are basic and very clear. We have Tikanga Matatika – a Code of Ethics, that is comprehensive and all embracing, and while SCHOOL is a partnership between the Catholic Church and the Ministry of Education, the HOSTEL is privately owned by the Sisters and administered by our Trust Board. Our Hostel is not Government administered or owned, i.e. not Ministry of Education. Kei a rātou ano a rātou tikanga, kei a tātou a tātou – Kia ora!


Kauā e pā pouri mai e Te Whānau engari kua tae mai te wā hei whakamārama atu anō, ā he inoi atu hoki ki te tokoiti, kia tika, kia pai te kuhu mai ki te wāhi noho o ngā kotiro. Our message (our rules, our standards, our expectations) is very clear – and we will not be harassed, bullied, threatened, or intimidated, into making decisions that compromise the overall health and well-being (physical, emotional, social, cultural and educational) of this community or be distracted from our core business, i.e. the educational needs of Māori girls. Attendance at St Joseph's is a privilege not a right.

As we move through different levels of Covid, we are once again reminded of how fortunate we are to have a student body who is so accepting and adapts so well to changes. The boarders are away from their whānau and outings outside of the College boundary are restricted. The girls don't complain, or whine, or whinge. They just get on with what they need to.

Our thoughts are also with one of our Australian Year 11 students, Piri McGregor, who cannot return back until mid-March due to MIQ regulations.
