Code of Ethics Tikanga Matatika Māori o Hato Hohepa

Our Ethics are detailed in the following Principles which are to be followed in the context of our Māori and Hāhi Special Character.



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Principle 1 Mātāpono Tuatahi

PRIOR KNOWLEDGE – TE MĀTAURANGA MĀORI MAI RĀNO

The knowledge, recognition and understanding of the past, present and future of St Joseph's Māori Girls' College as established by the Sisters of Our Lady of the Mission to provide a safe and supportive environment for Māori girls to learn as Māori - **this is the reason for the school's continuing existence**.
